## This winter, over half of students in grades K-9 performed at or above grade level expectations.

Universal screening tools are used to measure success and guide decisions.

Students in grades K-9 are assessed each fall, winter, and spring in the areas of Reading and Math. Some students are progress monitored at regular intervals established by an instructional support team.

Grades K-1 use an assessment tool called aimsWeb Plus. Grades 2-9 use an assessment tool called STAR.

Universal screening tools are norm-referenced assessments. This chart shows the number of students performing at a rate at or above the grade level expectation for the benchmark period selected. It also shows the number of students in need of academic intervention based on the results of the screening.

At/above grade level $=40$ th percentile or above
On Watch $=$ 26th-39th percentile
Intervention = 11-25th percentile
Urgent intervention $=10$ th percentile or below

## Students absent due to COVID protocols

- In the first semester, the greatest number of students in quarantine or isolation was 456 ( $8 \%$ ) on January 7, 2022 when there were 218 active cases.
- As of January 28, 2022 there were 1,336 cases reported for the 2021-22 school year; 738 cases were reported from January 1 through January 28, 2022.
- The greatest number of days missed due to quarantine or isolation by a single student was 28 days; $31 \%$ of all instructional days in the first semester.
- 2,919 students were impacted by quarantine or isolation in the first semester as follows:

Missed 25+ days $=2$ students Missed 20-24 days $=10$ students Missed 15-19 days $=56$ students Missed 10-14 days $=352$ students Missed 5-9 days $=1,286$ students Missed 1-4 days $=1,213$ students
